Gently clean around the wound with soap and clean water. Pat dry and apply an adhesive bandage or dry clean cloth. Leave unclean wounds, bites, and punctures open. Wounds that are not cleaned correctly can trap bacteria and result in infection. Provide pain relievers when possible. Review the wound every 24 hours.
